
Submarines Lost/Damaged During the Month of October

- USS O-5 (SS-66) 11-Oct-1923. Two men lost.
- USS S-44 (SS-155) 7-Oct-1943. 56 men lost and two taken as POW. Both survived the war.
- <u>USS Wahoo (SS-238)</u> **11-Oct-1943**. All hands lost (79).
- <u>USS Dorado (SS-248)</u> **12-Oct-1943**. All hands lost (78).
- USS Escolar (SS-294) 17-Oct-1944. All hands lost (82).
- USS Shark II (SS-314) **24-Oct-1944**. All hands lost (90).
- <u>USS Seawolf (SS-197)</u> **3-Oct-1944**. All hands lost (102).

<u>USS Tang (SS 306)</u> **24-Oct-1944**. 78 men lost. 9 taken POW and survived the war. CDR Richard O'Kane was awarded the Medal of Honor for his leadership and heroism as CO.

USS Darter (SS-227) 24-Oct-1944. All the crew was rescued by USS Dace.

USS Escolar (SS-294) October 17, 1944 – All Hands Lost (82)



Escolar: A predatory fish of the open ocean related to the mackerels and funnies.

(SS-294: dp. 1,526; 1. 311'8"; b. 27'3"; dr. 15'3"; s. 20 k.; cpl. 66; a. 1 5", 10 21" tt.; cl. Gato)

Escolar (SS-294) was launched 18 April 1943 by Cramp Shipbuilding Co., Philadelphia, Pa.; sponsored by Mrs. J. Bilisoly Hudgins; and commissioned 2 June 1944, Commander W. J. Millican in command.

Escolar had her final training for combat at Pearl Harbor, from which she put out for her first war patrol 18 September 1944. After topping off fuel at Midway, she joined Croaker (SS-246) and Perch (SS-313) for a coordinated war patrol in the Yellow Sea which she directed.

On 30 September, she engaged a small craft in a surface gun action, and reported to her sisters that she was undamaged, without mentioning what her gunfire had done to the enemy ship. Her last communication was with Perth on 17 October- she was never heard from again.

Since Japanese records consulted after the war show no antisubmarine action at that time in the area where Escolar is believed to have been, it is assumed that she struck a mine and sank with all hands.

"We shall never forget that it was our submarines that held the lines against the enemy while our fleets replaced losses and repaired wounds," Fleet Admiral Chester Nimitz, USN.

Sub Studies: 24-Hour Setup Shows Promise 8-Hour Shifts Could Improve Sleep Patterns

Sam Fellman, Navy Times, Oct 2010 Submariners on patrol live in an artificial environment. They generate their own oxygen, bask in fluorescent light and even have their own, unique daily cycle: the 18-hour day. Typically, it's six on, six at work, and six off.

Now, submarine medical officials are studying whether a 24-hour day, which includes an eighthour rest, would improve crew performance. A recent six-week trial aboard the ballistic-submarine

Rhode Island suggests that the additional rest is excellent, but eight-hour watches present new issues.

"We're re-evaluating how we sleep and whether six hours is as optimal as doing eight hours," Cmdr. Robert Clark, Rhode Island's skipper, told Navy Times during an underway visit in August. "If you can get eight hours of sleep down, you go through more of the [rapid eve movement] cycle. Theoretically, people should be more alert and aware."

Recent studies have suggested that the body functions on a 24-hour physiological clock and that disruptions to this circadian rhythm, as it is known, will hinder reaction time and focus and increase stress.

Two short-term studies last vear aboard the ballistic sub Maryland and the attack sub Pittsburgh also saw performance gains from a 24-hour cycle, the lead researcher for the study told Navy Times in 2009.

Citing the ongoing nature of the studies, a submarine force spokesman declined to discuss its findings or expected completion date, but said there are no plans to expand the studies to other subs.

Aboard Rhode Island, preliminary results of the study suggest "that the guys were more focused," said Master Chief Fire Control Technician (SS) Jeffrey Bottoms, who serves as chief of the boat. "There was a 70-30 split of 'like' to 'not like'" for the new hours, he said.

The new cycle was broken into three eight-hour watches: midnight to 8 a.m., 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., and 4 p.m. to midnight.

It allowed sailors to sleep every day at the same time, but the change came with its own problems, Bottoms said.

One of the thorniest issues was keeping watchstanders sharp for entire shifts, Bottoms said. "The sonar techs had a tough time staying awake when looking at a green screen for eight hours."

Rhode Island planned its drills on patrol from 8 a.m. to noon, a period when all hands were expected to be awake. However,

that meant "the midwatch guys never got drills," Bottoms said. "It took longer to get the crew to where they should be."

Others didn't see much difference in the training. "Once they got a schedule figured out, it was easier to get drills and training in," said Chief Electronics Technician (SS/PJ) Steven Gildav. "It seemed to work fairly well."

From long watches to chow reliefs, many acknowledged that there are plenty of kinks left to iron out, but the 24-hour cycle has a lot of potential.

"Initially, there was a lot of dislike," Clark said. "By the end, I would venture to say a majority of personnel liked the eight-hour rotation. Now we're gathering from people what they really want and we'll try it again next patrol."

Submarine Laser Project Awarded To QinetiQ

QinetiQ has received a \$31.8 million contract to develop and construct a blue laser system for secret communications between an aircraft and a submarine.

Under the Tactical Relay Information Network (TRITON) program, the US Defense **Advanced Research Projects** Agency (DARPA) has awarded the contract. The DARPA will conduct a live assessment of the laser system for a naval exercise in the middle of 2012.

QinetiQ is currently working on the Submarine-Enabling Airborne Data Exchange and Enhancement Program (SEADEEP), a blue-laser communication system. This laser system can be transported using an unmanned aerial vehicle for supporting submarines.

DARPA has developed new cesium atomic line filters (ALFs) and blue solid-state lasers to generate emission at 459 and 455 nm wavelength. DARPA feels that the major component technologies are suitable enough for the use in an operational defense system. The first phase of the TRITON program includes development of cesium ALFs and multiple blue laser transmitter modules. Meanwhile, the development of

downlink laser systems, laser uplink, and receivers will also be done simultaneously.
